Before the *trip* to the Nueva Granada

Since the Spanish sailors arrived to

American territories, by the end of the 15th Century, many expeditions departed from Europe to the new world. They wanted to know the lands, determine their boundaries, and draw maps; to take advantage of their natural benefits, to know about the inhabitants, and to investigate about their customs.

José Celestino Mutis was one of those expedition members that arrived to America during the 18th century. He was born in Cádiz, Spanish port in the Atlantic Ocean, in 1732. He belonged to the delegation of Viceroy Pedro Messía de la Cerda, who had been appointed by Charles III, King of Spain, as his representative in the American territories of the Nuevo Reino de Granada.

He was both brave and ambitious. He had studied medicine in Seville, Cádiz, and Madrid, and after finishing his studies in Spain, he had the opportunity to travel to London or Bologna, both cities

well known by their prestigious medical academy centers. However, he preferred to embark towards America, as the Viceroy's doctor. With a sharp traveler's spirit and scientific training, he departed from Europe in 1760, at the age of 28, towards a new continent from where he was not to return.
